Walkers go round the Bend

Pound Bend Reserve is a pretty place now, with its entrance road winding down to a well mown native-grass flat dotted with picnic tables and shelters beneath tall, smooth gums flanking the Yarra River.

But it was not always like this. About one hundred and fifty years ago gold fever hit Victoria. Enterprising seekers of alluvial gold hacked a tunnel through the ridge (the pound) around which the river flowed, so short cutting the course of the Yarra. The river's cut-off loop was then drained and the exposed river bed plundered for its gold.

The day we were there, Wednesday, 12 January this year, there was no sign of splintered rock; coffer dams constructed of groaning timbers and iron; fetid, stinking pools of muddy water in the exposed river bed; or filthy men, horses and drays labouring up and down in it. Nor was there the sound of the men cursing, or shouting to be heard above the roar of the banked up river struggling to escape the downstream end of the diversion tunnel. On the contrary, it was a pleasant sunny morning, somewhat cooler than the blistering day before, and the only sound interrupting the stillness was the singing of the birds, the murmur of the river, and the chit chat of us 34 fitness footsloggers walking upstream on the river-side bush track heading north. There were a few groans to be heard later as, leaving the river path about one-third of the way up the river's skipping-rope loop, we climbed the steep ridge around which the river flows and, a bit farther on, a yell from one of the women walkers as she took a tumble on the unsealed and stony Pound Bend Road, grazing a knee.

One of the Pound's roads is called Boys Road, presumably because it takes you to the now vacant site of the first youth hostel to be built in Victoria. We stopped for a breather there and read the plaque proclaiming that the hostel had been built in 1940.

Away from the river valley the vegetation on the stony ridge took on a scraggier look, with woodier, lower profile eucalypts such as stringy bark and the parasitic but, nevertheless attractive, native cherry tree, now fruiting. With our loop walk of five kilometers almost completed, we dropped from the ridge to the river, where the tunnel exits, only to find the area around the tunnel exit portal roped off "for vegetative restoration and regeneration, and safety reasons" according to the accompanying signs. We sought solace by moving on to our picnic table by the river for our usual cup of tea or coffee at walk's end, only to discover that we were under surveillance from a high vantage by three magpies, two kookaburras and one (probably asleep) koala. The magpies, ever brazen, flew down and had their cheekiness rewarded by receiving morsels of shortbread, mince pies and Christmas cake.

The second of our Club’s fitness walks took place at this place a fortnight later. Those who walked that day may have seen the platypuses referred to on a sign displayed near the start of the walk. The sign said that platypus may be seen by a diligent observer at that part of the river, but if the walkers did not see them at that spot, they may have needed to walk further than we did – and, in looking for them, no doubt would have gone completely round the Bend.! Happy walking

Profile – John Wilson

I was born in Scotland in the east coast town of Buckhaven in the county of Fife on the north shore of the Firth of Forth with a distant view of Edinburgh across the water. Buckhaven was originally a fishing village but became caught up in the coal mining industry in which I started work with the National Coal Board as a mine surveyor and later as a mine planner designing layouts for the underground extraction of the coal seams. In 1968 I sensed that coal mining in Scotland had a limited future (which later proved to be correct) and I moved into the building construction industry as a site surveyor on civil engineering works.

In 1964 I met my wife to be Mary, a school teacher from Melbourne doing a 2 years teaching stint in Clackmannanshire where I was then working. We married in October that year and built our first home in Alloa near Stirling. In December 1969 with two very young children, Fiona and Gillian, we came out on 4 weeks holiday to Melbourne where I met Mary's parents and family for the first time. During this holiday I developed a taste for Australia and was able to secure an employment position in Melbourne. After returning to Scotland in January 1970 we arrived back in Melbourne as immigrants in July. I commenced work as a surveyor with Pioneer Quarries in Melbourne and we bought a house close to Templestowe Primary School. Our third daughter Katrina was born there in 1972. I had several work moves during the next few years including site surveyor at Collins Place twin towers in the City, Harold Stokes Building at the Austin Hospital and finally to the Gas and Fuel Corporation of Victoria where I worked in Head Office as a design draftsman and latterly planning officer over a period of 18 years until retirement. In 1981 we moved house close to Westerfolds Park where we still live. As well as having three daughters, all living in Melbourne, we also have three grand-daughters who give us lots of pleasure.

My hobbies include walking, cycling, golf - I am a member of our Probus golf group, travel, theatre and music. At the age of six I started to learn to play the violin and it has been a continuous hobby of mine to the present day. I played in an adult orchestra at the age of ten (youngest in the orchestra) and have played in numerous orchestras since both in Scotland and here in Melbourne. While living in Scotland, for many years I had fun playing for Scottish Country Dancing and also ballroom dances where I also played saxophone for a time. From 1974 to 1977, when international stars performed at Festival Hall, I was fortunate to have the experience of playing in the backing orchestras for Roy Orbison, Barry White, the Bee Gees, Shirley Bassey, Lovelace Watkins and Sammy Davis Junior. For 28 years I was a member of the Victorian Concert Orchestra which toured country Victoria giving concerts at weekends.

For the past seven years I have been a member of the Melbourne Sinfonia, an orchestra of some 50 players, which was formed in 1990 and which presents four concerts a year of music from the Baroque, Classical and 20th Century repertoire. The orchestra currently rehearses at the Royal Children's Hospital and has become an Auxiliary of the hospital supporting the Music Therapy Auxiliary at the hospital with surplus proceeds from concerts. Last year the orchestra donated \$3,000 to the Music Therapy Auxiliary which depends on donations, moneys raised by volunteer workers of which my wife Mary is one, and the orchestra to fund three part-time music therapists performing wonderful work helping the recovery of young children in the wards.

The orchestra features local artists as soloists and at its upcoming concert the soloist in Rachmaninoff's 3rd Piano Concerto is Cameron Roberts L.Mus.A (dist), a brilliant pianist who has studied and performed all over the world and is currently studying full-time for a Master's in Music Performance at Melbourne University. Details of the concert and tickets sales for anyone interested are shown separately in the Newsletter.
