



President's Message –Peter Fishley

Back in April, I was reading *The Age* when an article by Carol Nader, Health Reporter, caught my eye. The headline read: "Over 100 years, life gets longer." I wondered how many people living beyond 100 could possibly live an ever-lengthening life until I realised that the 100 years referred to the time period studied by a group investigating trends in mortality, and that "life gets longer" meant life expectancy within that time.

The study, carried out by the Australian Institute for Health and Welfare, showed that average life expectancy of Australians is now around the 80 years – 77 years for men and almost 83 years for women.

These statistics gave me a fright because I am now in my 72nd year. But, as Gwen Young said to me, "You don't feel old do you?" I had to agree I did not, thus cheering myself up considerably. I pondered also the fact that I had now outstripped my father, who died at 65, although I've a long way to go if I'm to reach my mother's age of departure at 94.

Back 100 years ago (the starting point for the survey) you were considered old at 50-plus years, despite the fact that the Bible cites "three score years and ten" as the optimum life span.

Although we are no longer succumbing when young to many childhood diseases nor to all the cancers, heart diseases and strokes which were once a sure thing to finish us off, the survey shows that we are now dying as a result of mental conditions and diseases of the nervous system. Dementia is one such.

The point about all this is that we need to seize the day - *carpe diem* – when it comes to all the things we wish to do before it is too late. This means prioritising the aspirations we have and acting on those that we know are at the top of the list. With spring upon us in another month, now is a good time to start the spring-cleaning of our lives. What will you put in order, starting today ... or maybe tomorrow? See, caught you out already! Seriously, give it some thought. In the meantime, enjoy all the good things Probus is offering you ... and stick around to keep the club strong.

Replies to Suggestions Received

At the July Club Meeting four suggestions were received. All were considered by the Committee at its meeting that afternoon.

The first was a proposal that the Fine Dining Group have one big dine out at a restaurant. After taking advice from the Convener, Hugh Cornell, to whom the suggestion was addressed, the Committee endorsed his view that, while the idea had merit, it was at odds with the idea behind the Fine Dining Group, which is to afford six people intimate social interaction over a meal together. As many people have now dined together in small groups any amalgamated dine out would involve about half the

club. Taking into consideration the frequency with which we dine together as a club - once a month now – and our once-a-year Christmas party coming up in December, when we hope to be able to attract most of our 130 members to dine together – the Committee recommended to the Convener that it preferred to see the Christmas function as being a better vehicle for a mass dine out of members.

The second suggestion was that Probus has no business involving itself in charitable works. This suggestion was based on an incorrect premise. The following extract from the Probus Club Handbook issued to all Committee members at the inception of the club reads:

"A Probus club is not a service club. Indeed it is specifically precluded by its constitutional documents from corporately raising funds. However, a club may, and many do, undertake small community projects and elect a community service officer or committee to organise or co-ordinate such activities. It is most important that the community service officer or committee, in recommending a corporate project, should make it quite clear that participation in the proposed project is completely voluntary; that, unlike membership in your sponsoring Rotary club, Probus membership imposes no obligation to serve."

The entry then goes on to itemise a number of service suggestions including knitting squares for sewing into rugs, and making toys for hospital children's wards (in our case read, collecting or buying books for distribution to children via The Smith Family).

The third and fourth suggestions were on the same subject, i.e. that we return to the presentation of information about activities directly by the Activities Leaders. The Committee's view is that it instituted the new arrangements as a way of streamlining the progress of the meeting and to overcome the tendency of the individual presenters to repeat information already provided in the *Newsletter*. So far (one presentation), it has achieved this purpose admirably. The need to fine-tune the information, keep it interesting, and dismay that a male presenter has substituted many women presenters, were issues raised by one correspondent. Apart from the last objection, which occurs because of the structure we have rather than any malevolent intent to undermine our women members, these aspects of presentation can and will be improved upon: however, they are not in themselves the issue. Let's give the idea a fair go, especially as it is working.

New Transport Initiatives- Free Travel for Seniors

Victorian Seniors Card holders are now eligible for som new benefits as of 27th August.

- Free Sunday Melbourne metropolitan travel as well as regional bus networks such as Geelong, Ballarat and Bendigo. (Metropolitan travel does NOT include Healsville, Warburton or Portsea services.)
- Two off peak travel vouchers per year posted out to Victorian Seniors Card holders..
- If you travel with someone who is NOT a Victorian senior they can get travel across Zones 1,2 and 3 for \$2.50 using a Sunday Saver Metcard. (Pre purchase at Premium Train Stations, MetShop and on line at metlinkmelbourne.com.au only. Not available at machines or on buses or trams.
- To apply, you must have a Victorian Seniors Card. Seniors cards holders from other states are not eligible
- An application form must be lodged. These are available at Premium Train Stations, and retail Metcard outlets. After August 28th, application can be made at all Premium Train Stations. There will be information brochures about the Seniors Pass at our August meeting. This has an application form attached.

Profile – Ron McBain

Acting under direct orders from our esteemed president I now succumb to the embarrassing task of offering my profile to members of the Templestowe Valley Probus Club.

I was born in Melbourne's western suburbs and spent my first 20 plus years moving from house to house in, West Footscray, Tottenham, Yarraville and finally to Braybrook before Dad retired and Mum and Dad finally bought their first house on the peninsula in Rosebud.

I started my working life as an apprentice fitter machinist at the Government Ammunition Factory in Footscray and 5 years later qualified as a Toolmaker. This early start to working life culminated in some 40 years of employment with the same facility, although we went through many name changes over this period it was still the same factory until its closure as Australian Defence Industries some years ago.

My working life consisted of many tasks during those 40 years, moving from a back ground in toolmaking to the Metrology Laboratory was a significant jump that led to many enjoyable years in this specialist field. Dispersed among the many tasks were various stints as a Quality Control Forman at various levels, quite a few years in the special projects area of Munition production, Project planning and design and development of special small arms projects.

At the end of each of these stints I returned back to the Metrology field ultimately becoming Manager of the laboratory in 1981. This laboratory was to ultimately become one of the top 5 Metrology laboratories in the world and was renowned for its technical competence and its high level of sophisticated measuring equipment.

This high level of expertise and equipment meant that I spent quite some time visiting measuring equipment manufactures and other Defence facilities in various countries through out the world, more specifically, Germany, Switzerland, Sweden, UK, and the USA.

Being the leading specialist Metrology Lab in Australia and being Accredited with the National Association of Testing Authorities Australia (NATA) meant that I also become

involved with NATA, ultimately becoming a NATA Assessor, a member of the Accreditation Advisory Committee Australia, and a foundation member of the Metrology Society of Australia and the CMM Group of Australia, ultimately becoming Chairman. The presentation of numerous papers in the specialist area of co-ordinate Metrology led to international recognition for myself and the laboratory.

Resigning in 1994 I set up my own purpose built Metrology laboratory at my home in Doncaster which up to this date is still functioning as a private NATA laboratory.

In all of these years of commitment to work one has to have a form of steadying influence and I must say that I met mine in the form of young lady by the name of Miss Lynette Tidd on the beach at Rosebud in 1961.

Having married this young lady in 1963 and having three of the most fantastic children, Dean, Paul and Karen our lives have been one happy existence, and now with the advent of six grand children it is quite handy to have a hobby in making wooden toys etc.

We spent some early years of married life living in a small one room flat in Newport and after purchasing a block of land in 1962 in Doncaster built our one and only home in which we still reside.

Whilst living in Doncaster my hobbies extended to the building of yachts in the backyard, some four 23 foot trailable yachts and associated trailers etc. As full time retirement approaches, Lynette and I intend to extend our overseas visits and hook up the caravan for a lap around the block whilst we still have the fractious nature required to partake in these activities which also includes involvement with our fantastic Probus group.

To the uninitiated the word Metrology means:” The scientific study of Measurement” and the acronym CMM stands for “Co-ordinate Measuring Machine”
